Earning Spanish Language, Literatures, and Cultures Credits Abroad

The Office of International Studies and Programs (OISP) offers many study abroad options in Spanish speaking countries, but not all of these programs are geared toward encouraging students' language abilities in Spanish. If you are interested in developing your Spanish while abroad, you will want a program that:

- offers course work that includes language classes
- courses on different subjects *taught in Spanish* (for credit toward a Spanish major, you will need classes on Latin American or Spanish literature, linguistics, and cultural topics)
- includes home stays with local families (or other housing arrangements in which you will be immersed in Spanish, such as a student residence or dorm, though be aware that in "international student residences" the lingua franca may be English)
- bonus: provides volunteer, internship, service-learning, or other civic engagement opportunities (seek out opportunities to use your Spanish; some internships may be more interested in using your English skills)

Programs Sponsored by the Department of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures

We encourage our majors and minors to study abroad on any of our approved programs in **Chile, Spain** and **Panama**. These are programs Spanish faculty are personally involved with and we know that the courses align well with our curriculum. These programs are designed for other majors or for general education, with language skill development as a secondary emphasis. We encourage all students on these programs to take language classes to get the most out of their experience.

Please note: the advisor for Languages, Literatures, and Cultures (Laura Edwards) cannot pre-articulate courses or advise for non-LAN programs.

- If you don't know any Spanish at all, take a basic language class so you can communicate with locals. Even if they know English or even if you have an interpreter, most people appreciate tourists' efforts to speak in the language of the country they are visiting. When you return to ISU, bring us your syllabus and coursework so we can give you ISU credit. And if you come home wanting to learn more, we can help place you at the right level.
- If you have had some Spanish, but aren't sure of your level, you should follow your program's guidelines
 for placement. It is often difficult to pre-articulate courses without knowing how courses are taught or
 how students are placed, but we will be happy to work with you upon your return to be sure you get
 credit for the work you do and apply it toward a Spanish minor or even a major!
- If you are a Spanish major and are looking for 300-level courses, you'll need courses taught *in Spanish* on *linguistics* and/or *literature* and/or advanced *topics in culture* (such as Latin American film or art or a course that studies a cultural topic in depth).

Affiliated Programs

Please follow the same guidelines as above. If you take coursework abroad that advances your language abilities, faculty in LAN will be delighted to work with you to give you credit upon your return. Indeed, we hope you will consider a minor or major in the language, or at least continue your study at ISU.
